*Rebecca Elder

Rebecca Elder has served as the Adjunct Preservation Field Services Officer for Amigos Library Services Imaging & Preservation Service since 2004. She received her MLS and a Certificate of Advanced Studies for Conservation Studies from The University of Texas at Austin, Rebecca has a significant amount of experience in preservation and conservation through her previous work at Harvard, the Harry Ransom Center, the Center for American History in Austin, and the Smithsonian Institution. Currently she teaches preservation workshops and conducts site surveys in her role with Amigos. She is also the owner of Austin BookWorks, a private conservation practice. Rebecca is a member of ALA and the American Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works (AIC).

*David Haynes

David Haynes first became interested in the history of photography when he worked at the University of Texas's Photography Collections as a graduate student in the late 1060s. After graduation, Haynes became an audiovisual specialist for the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio. Since leaving the institute in the mid-1990s, Haynes has participated in a variety of museum and publishing projects as a consultant. Over the last three decades, Haynes has published articles on the history of photography in a variety of journals and magazines. His major work, *Catching Shadows: A Directory of 19th Century Texas Photographers*, was published by the Texas State Historical Association in 1993, Haynes has given talks on the care and use of historic photographs to numerous professional and civic groups. For 20 years, he led discussions on historic photography as a faculty member of the annual Winedale Museum Seminar with Texas Historical Commission.
